The Rector's Corner

Liturgical In-Between Time

We have just finished the final sorting and packing away of the many things that were used in our celebrations of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. Everything has found its way back into marked boxes and onto designated shelves in the attic spaces about Bristol Hall and the upstairs classrooms. Just like at home. the process of putting things away does not

have the anticipation that accompanies unpacking the treasures. On Sunday, 2/2, we marked The Feast of the

Presentation of our Lord in the Temple, also known as Candlemas, and that truly is the end of the infant narrative cycle. We are now in the midst of just about a month of inbetween time. The next

liturgical season is, of course, Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5. In-between times can serve a number of purposes. They provide an opportunity to pause and catch our breath. In the church calendar, it is called Ordinary time or the Sundays after Epiphany. Beginning the Sunday after Epiphany, the color is green, and the focus is on hearing through Scriptures the revelation of Jesus' true identity. The next Sunday was the Baptism and the last Sunday before we cross over into Lent is The Feast

of the Transfiguration.

The word epiphany is Greek for manifestation. During this time, we are invited to allow the teachings to wash over us as Jesus is more and more revealed as God incarnate.

It's a huge truth. It's a reality that surpasses human understanding. It is something that we come to accept by faith.

In-between, I think, is an accurate description within conversations of faith. My belief of Jesus Christ as my strength and Redeemer is clear, and at the same time, I move in-between certainty and questioning. I live in the in-between. Maybe you do, too.

New offering: Evening Prayer in Lent

We wil be offering Evening Prayer on Mondays and Fridays at 5:30 p.m. during Lent.

This brief service from the *Book of Common Prayer* is a meaningful way to close the work day and move into the evening hours. This spoken service, which is meant to fit into a stop on your way home from work or before heading out to supper, lasts about 20 minutes.

Please consider making this part of your Lenten observance so that All Saints can begin a new tradition in our parish Lenten observance.

Thank you for your flexibility and support a I continue to move us toward a pattern for receiving Holy Eucharist that respects personal piety and practice and aligns with diocesan expectations and our post-COVID health practices..

Keeping in mind that it is our theology that reception in "one kind" is full and complete communion, it is your decision to receive the bread, wine, or both. You may also participate in communion by coming forward for a blessing without receiving either of the elements.

While it may be logistically easier to have those who want to drink from the chalice go to one side of the communion rail and those who want to instinct/dip go to the other, I do not want to split the congregation or families at the rail. I also am committed to maintaining a practice that allows each worshiper the space to focus on the grace of coming to be fed without distraction or wondering where to go. We come together to worship in unity, are fed in unity, and are sent forth together to serve.

Our bishop has directed that individuals should not instinct/dip their own host into the chalice. This rule is meant to prevent our fingers from coming in contact with the wine. We have used a shallow bowl to prevent this. However, to allow some to drink from the chalice and others to instinct at all places at the rail, we now have two chalices and two shallow bowls—and it is very crowded.

Therefore, beginning in Lent, our practice will be as follows

- We will no longer use the shallow bowls for intinction.
- You may drink from the chalice.
- If you prefer to receive the wine by intinction, you will hand the host to the eucharistic minister who will dip the tip of the host into the wine and hand it back to you for you to consume.

I know this is another change. Changes may take time to become comfortable. This practice will allow us to adhere to diocesan requirements and accommodate personal piety for reception of the bread and wine while allowing everyone to come to the rail focused only on the grace of being fed the sacred meal of Eucharist.

Lenten Study


This year we're using The Discovery Series, produced by the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, as our jumping off point. Brief videos will open the discussion for each session. In the first two sessions of this five-session program, we will assess our spiritual gifts, our individual place in ministry, and the importance of personal involvement. Then, we will spend three sessions exploring how our stories are reflections of the biblical story and how the sharing of our stories is an important aspect of sharing the faith.

Each Wednesday session is offered twice for your convenience. The morning session runs from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. and concludes with Noonday Prayers. After a soup and salad supper at 6:15, the evening session begins at 6:45 and concludes with a 15-minute service of Compline
